## What are some of the things that hospitals are doing to prevent C

To prevent C. diff. infections, doctors, nurses, and other healthcare

- Carefully clean hospital rooms and medical equipment that have been used for patients with C diff.
- o Whenever possible, patients with C. diff will have a single room other patients. Contact Precautions mean: or share a room only with someone else who also has C. diff.
- Visitors may also be asked to wear a gown and gloves.

- o Patients on Contact Precautions are asked to stay in their hospital rooms as much as possible. They should not go to to other areas of the hospital for treatments and tests. common areas, such as the gift shop or cafeteria. They can go
- Only give patients antibiotics when it is necessary.

### What can I do to help prevent C. diff infections?
